church donations, candy, etc.) Younger boys, who pay children's prices at the movies, should be able to manage nicely on \$1.00 or \$1.50. Parents should advise us how much allowance a boy may withdraw each week, and should also indicate on what occasions he may withdraw additional spending money (for instance, at the beginning of the semester for school supplies, at holiday or birthday shopping times, for our annual trip to a seaside resort). Touring boys frequently need a boost to their allowances on tour so that they may take advantage of sight-seeing trips, etc.

- 3. It is requested that parents inform friends and relatives of our Student Bank system and suggest that any money sent to the boys be deposited in their Student Bank account. An effort is made to discourage unnecessary spending, but parents should also have an understanding with their sons about allowances before they come to school.
- 4. Boys have such expenses as haircuts, dry cleaning, postage of laundry boxes or payment of commercial laundry bills, etc., and sufficient funds should be deposited in Student Bank for these expenses to be deducted by our office. If a boy is to require chaperoned trips to doctor or dentist on a regular schedule, money to cover these expenses should also be deposited.
- 5. The linen service charge at the beginning of each semester will also be deducted from Student Bank; and you may request that payment for your son's birthday cake be taken from his Student Bank account if you wish.
- C. Please make all checks and money orders intended for the school payable to: The Columbus Boychoir School not to any individual staff member. Checks for your son's Student Bank Account should be clearly identified as such.
- D. The last paragraph in the Application Contract is to be interpreted in all normal circumstances as meaning that fees paid for the individual performances of students as singers or actors apart from Boychoir concerts are due the School, even though for technical reasons checks may be made payable to the boy himself. Such performances are part of the School's program of providing rich and varied experiences appropriate to the interests and talents of the boys. The general training and special preparation of a boy for a performance in television or on the concert or theatrical stage, and the maintenance of a program which makes such appearances possible in the first place, require this policy. No boy is compelled to accept an individual assignment of this kind but does so voluntarily for the experience and educational benefits he derives therefrom.
