

There is no fidgeting or working with scores. With selections memorized, the concentration is on perfecting tones, moods, shades and expressions. Remembering Haleys' command to "demand something of those notes and don't be satisfied

with less," they strive for perfection. It is no longer difficult, for they have learned to love music and singing. If Bryant feels it is necessary, they will rehearse for five hours before a concert

Reminders are more gentle. "During 'My Lord Went a Mournin' some of you boys were smiling. How could you possibly smile during that number?" asked Bryant.
