of reverence and humility. This feeling projected itself to the audience which was visibly moved. In his second number The Lord has Given Me a Song, Bill expressed tenderly and wistfully his innermost expressions of grateful thanks for what he has, and for the pleasure he is able to give others by this gift of song.

In spite of a throat difficulty which has been bothering him, due to the extreme cold here, his soprano voice soared to high A on several occasions and in the familiar O Holy Night, his top note was B flat, clear and true. His voice. which has a mezzo quality, has developed amazingly since he has been training with the Boychoir, and he seemed quite easy and comfortable in the wide range from low to high. His breath control and resultant phrasing and variable tonal qualities were remarkable.

In The Holly and the Ivy, the piano accompaniment by his mother made a duet out of the lively carol. Words were at all times clearly defined, and here we heard a lighter approach, in contrast to the selection Don't Gry Mother Dear, which was tender and sweet. One could almost see again the little lame boy Amahl, in Menotti's Christmas Opera

years ago, as he sang the haunting theme to his opera mother, as he offered to go out and beg for food.

Bill was warmly applauded, and recalled at the conclusion of his listed songs. He graciously included his mother as he took bow after bow. His encore number was the nostalgic Ye Banks and Braes which brought tears again to the eyes of an audience which loved every minute of the entire program.

Jean Price and Bill made a

wonderful team, and the affinity between mother and son was touching exemplifying the complete understanding between these two, as she followed every nuance of the voice with her sensitive accompanying.

Bill Sonnichsen, Festival Association president, brought all three performers back on stage and publicly thanked them for giving us a wonderful evening of music..... J. Y.
